Did you enjoy the story? What was your favourite part?

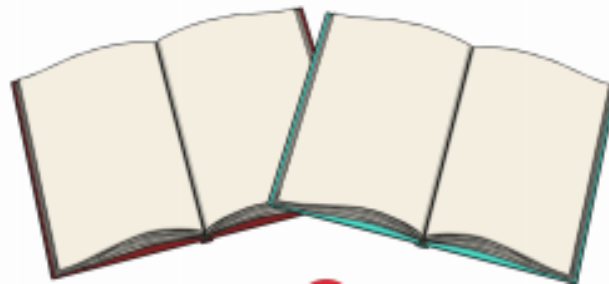

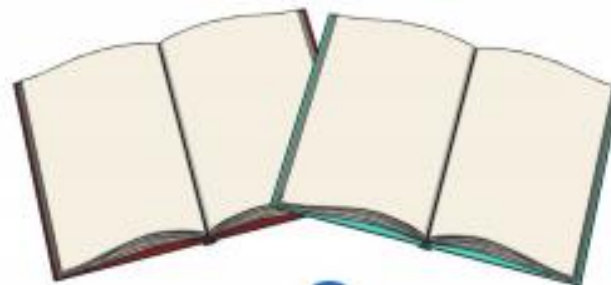

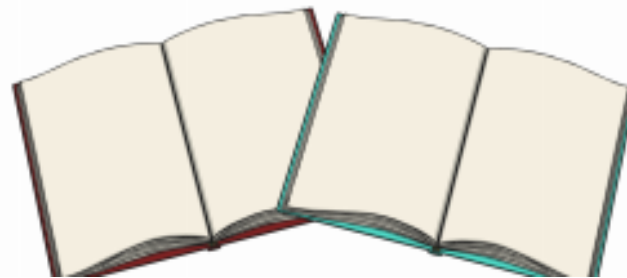

What is the book called? Why?

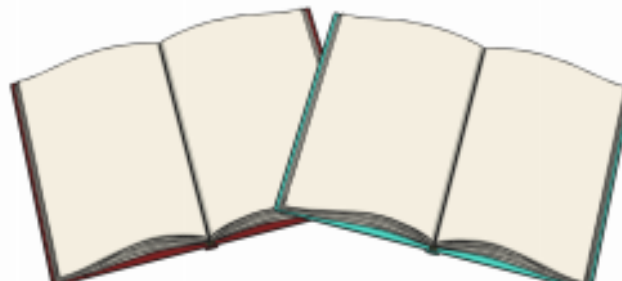
What is the book about? What is its purpose?

What are the main themes of the book?

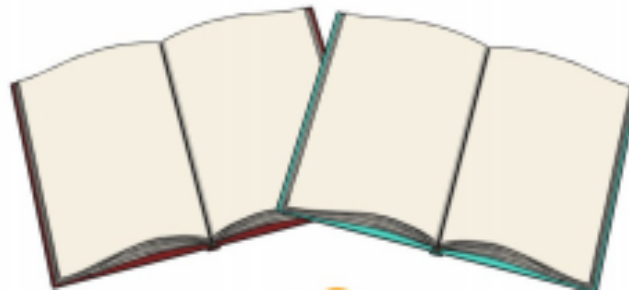
Why has the author used humour in the text?
